Cheshire & Warrington: Sustainable & Inclusive Economic Plan What do we know about Cheshire & Warrington's economy?



Economy

- £35bn worth of goods and services produced in 2021.
- Productivity is high but not consistently growing strongly.
- Manufacturing is highly productive.

Employment & skills

- Unemployment is low.
 - 18.6% of jobs earn below the Real Living Wage.
- Highly skilled workforce.

Inequalities

- Ageing population.
- Increasing gap between annual earnings and house prices.
- 47 neighbourhoods in most deprived 10% for health outcomes.

Net zero



- C&W has a large industrial footprint.
- High energy consumption and transport emissions.
- Home to net zero / low carbon opportunities.

Linking the subregion to Cheshire East's economy



- £14.6bn worth of goods and services produced in 2021
- Productivity is above C&W and UK average

Economy

 Specialisms in: Manufacture of pharmaceutical preparations, Risk and damage evaluation, Support activities for animal production, Manufacture of motor vehicles

Inequalities



- Older population than C&W average.
- House prices are 7.8 times earnings – higher than other parts of C&W.
- Healthy life expectancy of 67.4 (m) and 67.4 (f) – higher than the C&W and UK averages.

Employment & skills

- 3.1% unemployment similar to C&W average.
- 21.5% of jobs earn below the Real Living Wage - above the C&W average.
- Manufacturing is the 4th largest employer at 9.9% similar to C&W average of 9.1%.

Net zero

- High energy consumption at industrial sites in Crewe
- Transport is the largest source of CO2 emissions
- Low carbon opportunities.

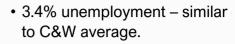
- £11.7bn worth of goods and services produced in 2021
- Productivity is above C&W and GB average
- Specialisms in: Manufacture of fertilisers and nitrogen compounds, Manufacture of hollow glass, Manufacture of other inorganic basic chemicals, Other credit granting

Inequalities



- Population is aging at the same rate as C&W as a whole
- House prices are 7.3 times earnings – higher than the C&W average.
- Healthy life expectancy of 63.1 (m) and 67.9 (f) – higher than the North West average.

Employment & skills



- 25.6% economic inactivity, higher than the C&W average
- 14.6% of jobs earn below the Real Living Wage - below the C&W average.
- Manufacturing is the 5th largest employer at 7.6% below C&W average of 9.1%.

Net zero



- High energy consumption at industrial sites in Ellesmere Port
- Industry is the largest source of CO2 emissions
- Low carbon opportunities.

Linking the subregion to Warrington's economy

Warrington is the most urban of C&W's three local authorities, with good connectivity to Manchester and Liverpool.

Key assets and major projects include: Birchwood Park Warrington New City Northern Powerhouse Rail

Economy

- Productivity is below C&W and UK average
- Specialisms in Treatment and disposal of hazardous waste, Accounting bookkeeping and auditing and Technical testing and analysis

Inequalities



- Younger population than C&W but predicted to age at faster rate.
- House prices are 6.3 times earnings – lower than other parts of C&W.
- Healthy life expectancy of 64.8 (m) and 64.6 (f) – lower than C&W average but higher than UK average

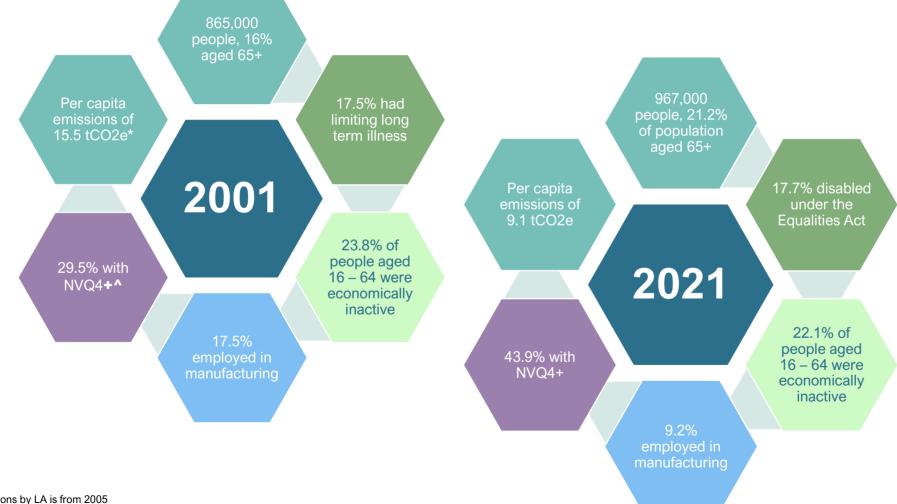
Employment & skills

- 3% unemployment similar to C&W average.
- 19% of jobs earn below the Real Living Wage - similar to C&W average.
- Manufacturing is the 4th largest employer at 9.9% similar to C&W average of 9.1%.

Net zero

- High energy consumption at industrial sites
- Transport is the largest source of CO2 emissions
- Low carbon opportunities.

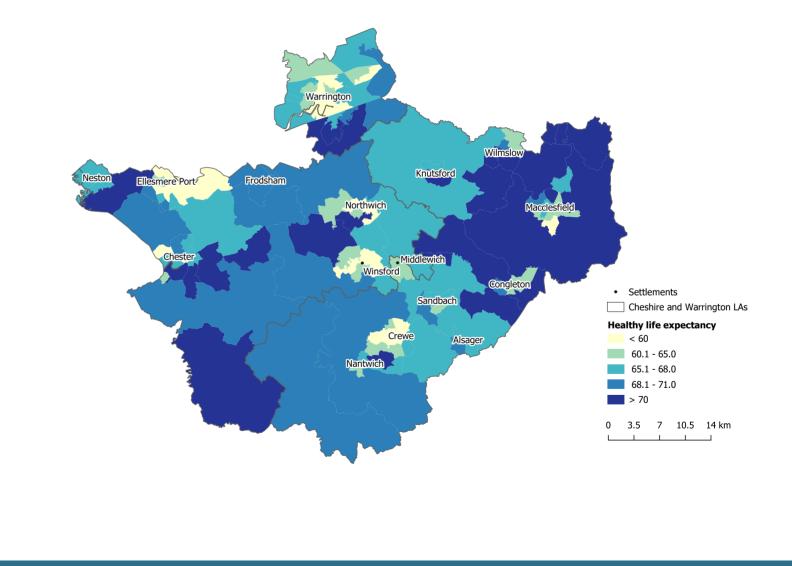

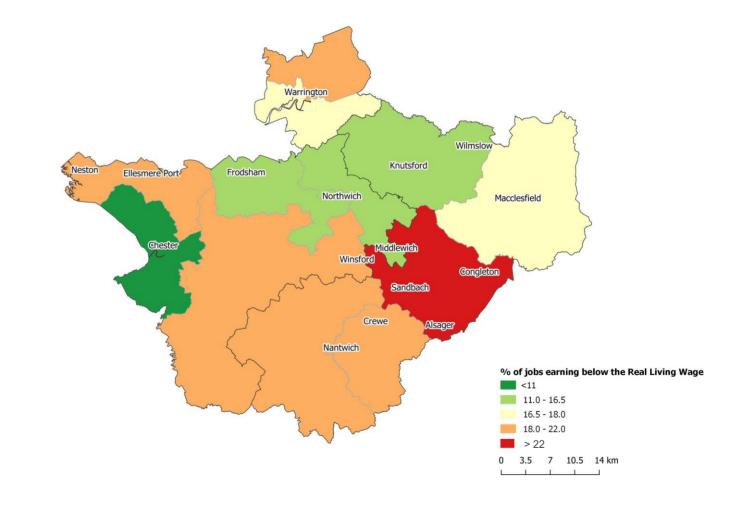

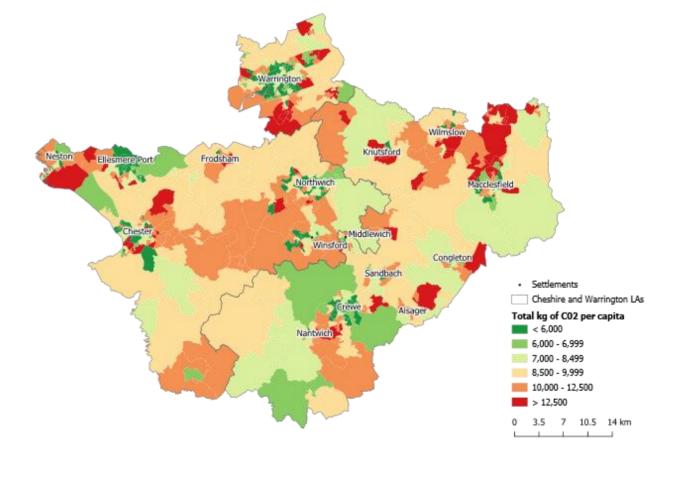
% of jobs earning below the Real Living Wage
